All Excellent and Esteemed – The Bassano Family

Piffaro: The Renaissance Band

“They are four brethren, all excellent and esteemed above all others in this city in their virtue,” was the report from King Henry VIII’s Venetian agent upon hearing the Bassanos. Not long after, many members of this family of wind players moved to Henry VIII’s court, while others remained in Italy as important players in the Venetian musical scene. Over the next few decades, this family extended the frontiers of instrumental music. The wind players of Piffaro, “the nation’s finest Renaissance wind band,” look at one of the most potent examples of musical immigration in 16th century Europe - the story of the Bassano family.

“Widely regarded as North America’s masters of music for Renaissance wind band” (*St Paul Pioneer Press*), **Piffaro** has delighted audiences throughout the United States, Europe, Canada and South America since its founding in 1980. Under the direction of Priscilla Herreid, Piffaro recreates the rustic music of the peasantry and the elegant sounds of the official wind bands of the late Medieval and Renaissance periods. Its musicians perform on an ever-expanding instrumentarium, which includes over 40 shawms, dulcians, sackbuts, recorders, krumhorns, bagpipes, lutes, guitars, harps, and a variety of percussion — all careful reconstructions of instruments from the period.

The Fine Arts Committee offers these programs as a gift to the community and encourages you to invite your friends. All events are free with the exception of the Thursday banquet which requires reservations.

We smile dozens, perhaps even hundreds of times per day, yet do all smiles result from a state of happiness? Indeed, all aspects of facial expressions are complex and can display mixed messages. Through original compositions for piano trio, mixed media, and collaborations with AI, join us for a musical tour of the many ways we communicate nonverbally.

Amy Aberg McLelland is an award-winning pianist whose playing has been described as “ravishing ...with a wonderful variety of tone colors and nuance of interpretation.” She holds certification through The Golandsky Piano Institute and coaches advanced pianists and instrumentalists across the U.S. and Europe in the Taubman Approach.

From Romania, violinist **Daniel Szasz** has been the Concert Master for the Alabama Symphony since 1997. Mr. Szasz has won numerous awards in national competitions in Romania, Italy and the U.S. His performances have been described as “breathtaking” and “exquisite” and have generated great enthusiasm among his audiences and in the press.

From China, **Xi Yang** has played cello for the Alabama Symphony since 2018. Her concerts have taken her across the globe to notable venues such as New York’s David Geffen Hall, Berlin and Vienna’s Konzerthaus, and the Great Hall of Moscow Conservatory.

In this talk, Maggie Crosland, the curator of European art at the Birmingham Museum of Art, will explore the surprising role humorous images played in the medieval Christian church. From foxes preaching to chickens to toilet humor, religious objects made in the years between 1200 and 1500 AD included a wide range of strange imagery meant to invoke both laughter and devotional contemplation. If you have ever wondered why snails go to war, or why elephants hate dragons, this is your chance!



Maggie Crosland is a specialist of medieval European art, with a particular interest in illuminated manuscripts and how people interacted with them.
