Music Notes

FANTASIA ON CHRISTMAS CAROLS is a 1912 work for baritone, chorus, and orchestra by the English composer Ralph Vaughan Williams. Conducted by the composer, it was first performed on September 12, 1912, at the Three Choirs Festival at Hereford Cathedral. The single-movement work of roughly twelve minutes consists of the English folk carols "The truth sent from above," "Come all you worthy gentlemen," and Sussex Carol ("On Christmas night all Christians sing"), all folk songs collected in southern England by Vaughan Williams and his friend Cecil Sharp a few years earlier. These are interposed with brief orchestral quotations from other carols, such as "The First Nowell."

"GREENSLEEVES" is a traditional English folk song. A broadside ballad by the name "A Newe Northen Dittye of ye Ladye Greene Sleves" was registered by Richard Jones at the London Stationers' Company in September 1580, and the tune is found in several late 16th-century and early 17th-century sources. Christmas and New Year texts were associated with the tune from as early as 1686, and by the 19th century, almost every printed collection of Christmas carols included some version of words and music together, most of them ending with the refrain "On Christmas Day in the morning." One of the most popular of these is "What Child Is This?" written in 1865 by William Chatterton Dix.

This exquisite four-minute orchestral miniature has far eclipsed the song it was inspired by. He didn't create it as a stand-alone piece, though; instead, it was initially used in the third act of the composer's Shakespeare-inspired opera *Sir John in Love*.

BACH'S MAGNIFICAT is believed to have received its first performance in St. Thomas's, Leipzig, at Vespers on Christmas Day, 1723, and was the first major work which the newly-appointed cantor performed in this church. In keeping with contemporary practice, Bach had set not only the text itself but also four Christmas anthems, which were interpolated into the score as a whole. From the Renaissance onwards, there had been a tradition of including extra items of particular relevance to the Christmastide festival. Some years later Bach revised his Magnificat, transposing it from E-flat to D major, expanding the orchestral forces, making a handful of changes to the instrumentation, and removing the Christmas interpolations. Bach's reason for reworking the piece may have been his desire to make the work suitable for any of the Church's high feasts.
