Music Notes

David Dahl (b. 1937) is an American composer, organist and teacher, and Professor of Music and University Organist Emeritus from Pacific Lutheran University, where he served for thirty years. He continues in his 36th year as the Director of Music Ministries at Christ Church, Episcopal, in Tacoma, Washington.

Kenneth Leighton (1929–1988) was a British composer and pianist. His compositions include church and choral music, pieces for piano, organ, cello, oboe and other instruments, chamber music, concertos, symphonies, and an opera. He had various academic appointments in the Universities of Leeds, Oxford and, primarily, Edinburgh. The IPC Choir sang these responses in his home church, St. Mary's Anglican Cathedral, in 2004

Herbert Sumsion (1899–1995) was an English musician who was organist of Gloucester Cathedral from 1928 to 1967. Through his leadership role with the Three Choirs Festival, Sumsion maintained close associations with major figures in England's 20th-century musical renaissance, including Edward Elgar, Herbert Howells, Gerald Finzi, and Ralph Vaughan Williams. Although Sumsion is known primarily as a cathedral musician, his professional career spanned more than 60 years and encompassed composing, conducting, performing, accompanying, and teaching. His compositions include works for choir and organ, as well as lesser-known chamber and orchestral works.

Gwyneth Walker (b. 1947) was born in New York to a Quaker family and grew up in New Canaan, Connecticut. She taught music for fourteen years at Hartt School of Music, the Hartford Conservatory and the Oberlin College Conservatory, and then moved to a dairy farm in Vermont and went to work as a full-time composer. Her catalog includes over 350 commissioned works for orchestra, chamber ensembles, chorus, and solo voice. *A Prayer of Compassion* combines traditional Psalms with the closing lines of Joh Greenleaf Whittier's poem "Divine Compassion." The biblical passages ask for the Lord's guidance that we may walk in the *paths of peace*. Extending the supplication, the poignant Whittier lines ask for human Compassion: *Let me keep a heart that still can feel, and eyes that still can weep*. in today's world of increasing violence, we are often challenged to remain sensitive to suffering, to respond with *a heart that still can feel, and eyes that can still weep*.

A "fugue" is a type of composition where one tune is played and then repeated in different ways to make harmony. The interplay of the tune as it occurs in different voices is called counterpoint. The way the composer controls this counterpoint is the genius of the composition. *A Triptych of Fugues* is a perfect example of type of counterpoint. **Gerald Near** (b. 1942) has established himself as one of the important composers of American church music. One of his earliest works of his long career, he premiered this work in an organ class as a student at the University of Michigan.

Joel Martinson (b. 1960) is the Director of Music and Organist at The Episcopal Church of the Transfiguration in Dallas. He has a particular penchant for writing lovely melodies with an interesting harmonic language.

British composer **Grayston Ives** (b. 1948) has written primarily sacred and secular music for choir, much of it written for the liturgy of Magdalen College Chapel where he was organist and choir director for 18 years. "Processional" begins and ends with chords of fanfare that bookend a quirky march of playful characters in a gleeful parade!

About Evensong

A NOTEABOUT EVENSONG: Evensong is the Service of Evening Prayer sung at the onset of evening to mark the close of the day with gratitude, and to compose the mind and renew the spirit for the coming week. The worship is truly ecumenical, drawing from traditions dating to the Fourth Century.

The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence before him. (Habakkuk 2:20) Silence is a difficult find these days. Many of us are even discomforted by it. Yet, God is most noticeably discovered in silence. We join together in quiet meditation prior to the beginning of the service. In this centering, we listen for God speaking to us from within, a voice all-too-often lost in the complex world about us. In finding our center, we are seeking and finding God.

From the rising of the sun to the going down of the same my Name shall be great among the Gentiles, and in every place incense shall be offered unto my Name, and a pure offering: for my Name shall be great among the heathen. (Malachi 1:11)

The presence of incense is yet another aid to focus our meditation. It calls our attention to the fact that we are no longer in the outer world, but in a sacred space seeking our inner sacredness. It symbolizes the sacrifice of prayer and self to God. You are invited to use incense in your home to heighten your aural experience in this time of worship.

Come, let us sing to the Lord; let us shout for joy to the Rock of our salvation. Let us come before his presence with thanksgiving and raise a loud shout to him with psalms. (Psalm 96:1-2)

Music is another aid to focus our meditation. Allow the wash of sound to envelope you, the choir assisting in the meditation of your sense. Join with spiritual focus to the prayers and psalms offered. Join with voice to the Apostles' Creed, the prayers, and the Hymn. Here beauty in language and music can speak to us of God in a rich and diverse way. Within this hallowed space you may forget the ceaseless activity of daily life and be still.
