Nataša Klasinc-Lončar and Miroslav Lončar formed their duo at the University of Graz, Austria, where they both studied the classical guitar with Marga Bäuml and Martin Myslivecek. They received their Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi. Klasinc & Lončar were winners of the Best Guitar Duo prize at the International Guitar Competition Toyoko Yamashita in Berlin. The duo has been performing internationally for over thirty years and has been featured as soloists with the Gaudeamus Chamber Orchestra, the Karlovac Chamber Orchestra, and the Split Opera Chamber Orchestra in Croatia; with the Camerata Academica in Austria; and with the Metropolitan Chamber Orchestra in the U.S.


Festival Banquet
